011-Course Description (from the Course Catalog):

This intensive video-based course focuses on developing proficiency in the standard written Arabic language, as well as formal spoken Arabic. It begins with learning of script and phonology, and works rapidly into a wide range of situation-based texts and topics that build vocabulary, grammar, and general communicative competence.

2) <u>Al-Kitaab fii Ta'alum al-Arabiyya: Part 1(second Edition)</u>, by Kristen Brustad, Al-Batal&Al- Tonsi. Georgetown University Press.

3) A Dictionary of Modern Written Arabic, by Hans Wehr, edited by J. Cowan.

Course Objective of Arabic 011:

By the end of 011 you will, in-shaa'a-llaah:

1) Have mastered the Arabic alphabet and Sound System, be able to distinguish and pronounce all Arabic sound, and write accurately from dictation.

2) Initiate social interactions, ask for basic information, and be aware of basic cultural aspects of social interactions in the Arab World.

3) Be able to talk about yourself, your education, your family, weather, student plans, friends,

and to interact with native speakers of Arabic accustomed to interacting with learners.

4) Comprehend simple written texts on familiar topics.

5) Comprehend simple audio/video texts of familiar topics.

6) Be able to compose simple paragraphs about yourself and your family and friends.

7) Know about differences between formal and spoken Arabic, recognize both registers.

8) Have an active vocabulary of about 300 Arabic words.

We will finish Alif-Baa book in approximately 4 weeks, and al-kitaab chapters <u>1-7</u> by the end of the Fall Semester, you will learn essential language features (definiteness, questions, present and past-tense verbs with negations, and numbers).

<u>1- Attendance and Participation (10%)</u>

Class time will be devoted to <u>activating</u> the vocabulary and structures that you have prepared at home through your homework. You should expect to spend 75% of class time doing activities in pairs and small groups. Thus, attendance and active participating in class is essential to your making good language proficiency gains and doing well in class. **This part of your grade will be based on daily ''attendance and participation** "grade assigned by your instructor and TA according to the following criteria:

<u>5-</u> You are **actively** engaged in developing your Arabic proficiency and communicating in Arabic **as much as possible** with your partner /classmates /teacher from the moment you walk into the class until you leave it.

Full credit will be given when you,

i. arrive to class on time.

ii. are well prepared for class, which means that you have listened to recorded materials on the accompanying web site/ DVD, learned the new vocabulary, read grammar explanations carefully and done the homework drills based on these explanations before coming to class.

iii. You submit fully completed homework at the beginning of class.

iv. are alert

v. participate actively when we are working together in class.

vi. Make maximum use of pair/group work time.

<u>4-</u> You are present but lacking in one of the above criteria for full credit in participation.

<u>3-</u> You are present but lacking in two of the above criteria.

2- You are present but lacking in three of the above criteria.

<u>1</u> You are present but lacking in more than three of the above criteria, for instance, you come late to class, submit incomplete homework, and are not focused on the assigned task during pair/group work.

<u>0</u>- Absent.

Attendance policies

If you are absent from class you will receive a "0" for that day's attendance and participation.

<u>I may excuse</u> up to <u>three</u> hours/absence at the end of the semester. <u>If you are sick please bring</u> a signed doctor's slip, coach, or dean note. More than three unexcused absences will

result in a lowered grade for the course More than 10 absences-whatever the reason-

will result in an "F" for the course.

Please inform me by email of absence as soon as possible *before*-not *after*- the class you will <u>miss.</u>

2- Homework Assignments & corrections (15 %)

Expect to spend about 2 hours on homework for every class session. **Expect to spend up to an extra hour per day on homework during the first month of the course**. To prepare for the learning that takes place through practice in class, you will listen, read and study new material at home. There will be designated homework in the schedule. **Daily written assignments due at** the **beginning of class**.

Homework assignments will be rated on a scale of 1 to 5 (5 = excellent; 4=good but not your best effort; 3= mediocre; 2= poor; 1= very poor work). You will be rated on the overall quality of your work, not merely on the number of correct or incorrect answers. Note that you do not have to have everything 100% correct on your homework in order to get "5" as long as you have made your best effort.

On each homework assignment:

- 1- Write your name in Arabic as soon as you are able to.
- 2- Write the drill # and page.
- 3- Staple **pages together**.
- 4- Write every other line in order to leave room for feedback from your instructor or TA.

Homework correction You will be asked to make corrections on your written homework-on the same sheet- using a different color ink. Your instructor will use a simple code to mark errors in writing/ spelling, and grammar.
