Course Description

Should we protect patient confidentiality even if doing so may harm others? Is it morally permissible to allow parents to deliberately select for the presence of a particular disease or disability in their child? Is it ever okay for a doctor to lie to a patient "for the patient's own good"?

Ethics examines and develops theories of right and wrong generally. Bioethics focuses on ethical issues in medical research, biotechnology, and healthcare at both the individual and global level. In this course, we will examine five key issues in contemporary bioethics: patient and provider autonomy, disability, human enhancement, reproduction, and climate change. Our aim will be to understand the complex ethical issues that arise in actual case studies and develop philosophically sophisticated responses.

Learning Goals

- Develop a familiarity with important case studies and contemporary approaches to bioethics.
- Increase proficiency in reading, interpreting, and assessing philosophical arguments through clear analytical writing.
- Acquire strategies for sustaining meaningful and productive philosophical discussions.

Assessment

Assessment will consists of two papers, two in-class tests, and regular pop-quizzes.


