Course Description

From understanding the mechanisms behind some of your own daily life decisions to understanding behavior of firms, this course will explain it all. The course aims to introduce you to the basic foundations of microeconomics. It will provide you with an insight into how markets work, what gives rise to market failures, what drives consumer and producer behavior, organization of industries and uncertainty.

Throughout the course, we will rely on the use of basic mathematics and graphical analysis for a more thorough understanding.

General Comments

While my objective is to provide you with a clear understanding of the materials covered in the course and in the process encourage you to study this further, I will need your help in doing so. I strongly encourage you to ASK questions both during class and office hours. Asking questions will not only help you but also your peers (a good example of positive externality. Just one of the many concepts we will cover!).

Prerequisites

This course has no official prerequisites. Basic mathematics and graphical techniques will be used. If the need arises to cover some math concepts as we proceed, I will do so. The first lecture will also be spent in reviewing some math that will help you in the rest of the course. Advanced math knowledge is NOT needed.

Textbook

Recommended: Principles of Microeconomics, 6th/7th edition, Mankiw; Microeconomics 12th/13th edition, Parkin;

Note: There is not much difference among different editions. If you intend to purchase a textbook, buying either of them (not both) and opting for an older edition should be fine. Reading the textbook will help you build a solid foundation and is strongly recommended.
